

Kicking the metaphorical bucket? Verbal multi-word expressions in verse

Verbal multi-word expressions are far more multifaceted than prose phrases and idioms, e.g. Plato, *Republic*, 364a ἐξ ἑνὸς στόματος ὕμνοισιν ‘to sing from the same hymn sheet / to agree’. For the PARSEME Ancient Greek corpus (www.ancientgreekmwe.com/), we are annotating a corpus of literary classical Attic historiography, oratory, and philosophical prose using the Natural-Language-Processing-inspired PARSEME 1.3 guidelines (<https://parsemefr.lis-lab.fr/parseme-st-guidelines/1.3/index.php?page=home>). However, verbal multi-word expressions are highly susceptible to diachronic, diatopic, and diastratic developments (e.g. Tronci 2017, Fendel 2023, Squeri 2024). Therefore, this workshop looks beyond the current corpus and specifically at multi-word expressions in verse, thus adding stylistic variation to the complications, e.g. when variation of an established idiom is creatively done for comic effect (cf. German *jemandem demokratischen Sand in die Augen streuen*).
